#### **HEALTHFUL LEGIS-**LATION IS ENACTED



# HARDING TO GO

President Plans to Make Twenty Speeches on the World Court.

#### ISSUE BEFORE NEXT SENATE

Chief Executive Hopes to Force Congress to Act Favorably, Despite Opposition to Submit Plan to Public During Vacation.

Washington, March 6 .- The earnestness with which President Harding adheres to his determination that the United States should be represented on the court of international justice created by the League of Nations was asserted in a letter made public at the White House written by Mr. Harding to Earl D. Bloom, lieutenant governor of Ohio.

Publication of this letter immediately after adjournment of congress and the failure of the senate to act upon the President's request for authority to name an American member of the international court signaled the intention of the President to exert all the influence he can upon the country in behalf of his proposal during the long legislative vacation.

Mr. Harding is expected to take the stump in support of the world court. During the summer and fall he is expected to make twenty addresses on the subject. Secretary Hughes also may address the public in support of

The President confidently believes that the great majority of the people are with him in his conviction that the United States should participate in the international court and he proposes to leave no stone unturned to convince the new senate that its favorable response to his request should be promptly granted.

New York, March 6. - Thirteen deaths from sleeping sickness occurred in Brooklyn during the week from February 24 to March 3, the department of health announced. Dusseldorf, March 6.—One German was killed, one wounded, and one captured at Westerhold, when French soldiers discovered them tampering with a railroad switch. A German was killed at Horde Sunday night in a collision with a French patrol. Another German was shot by a French sentry at Bochum.

SIX IRISHMEN DIE IN BATTLE

Big Fight Occurs in County Kerry-Three of Dead Were Free State Regulars.

Dublin, March 6.-A big fight occurred in County Kerry Monday night, three irregulars being killed, three wounded and seven taken prisoners. The troops suffered casualties of one lieutenant, one sergeant and one private being killed.

Want Old Conditions Restored. Washington, March 6.-Panama canal employees affiliated with labor organizations have petitioned President Harding to restore the practice of furnishing them free rent, fuel, light, electric power and service for dwellings.

Hardings on Vacation. Washington, March 6. - President Harding left Washington with Mrs. Harding and a party of friends on a special train for Florida for a four or five weeks' houseboat cruise on the inland waterways.





National banks are required to build up a surplus to at least twenty per cent of the capi tal. Many banks accumulate a much larger fund. The surplus belongs to the stockholders, but, like capital, it remains with the bank.

III. Undivided Profits, \$48,015.91 Undivided profits also represent earnings of the bank which have not been distributed in the form of dividends or added to the surplus fund, but which, like the capital, and surplus are due to stockholders. The best managed banks do not pay out all of their earnings in dividends. Their aim is to keep the undivided profits account growing, so that substantial amounts, when earned, may be transferred to the surplus fund. The latter is changed only atstated intervals while the amount of undivided profits is changing daily as the earn is of the bank change.

IV. Demand and Time Deposits, \$1,200,654.80

Demand and time deposits make up the amount which the bank owes to the persons, firms, and corpora tions that are its depositors.

V. Rediscounts and Money Borrowed,

When the demands of borrowing customers exceed the amount of loanable funds a bank has on hand, the bank, if a member of the Federal Re serve System, borrows money from the Federal Reserve bank of its district, by pledging its securities, such as Liberty bonds, or by rediscounting first class commercial paper, already discounted for its customers. VI. Reserve for Taxes and Interest

As a bank's earnings accumulate here are certain rather large items uch as taxes and interest, payable by the bank each year, which it would be a mistake to carry under the heading of undivided profits. Many banks set aside monthly the proportionate amounts required to pay such items.

VII. Circulation \$25,000. State banks do not issue bank rays had the privilege of issuing heir own bank notes under condions prescribed by law. These notes circulate as money, and are known is national bank notes. The national oank first buys United States bonds of a face value equal to the amount of the circulation it desires to issue. but this amount may not exceed its capital. The bonds are placed in the keeping of the Treasurer of the United States in order to insure redemption, that is, repayment of the

irculating notes. Explanation of the Bank's Resources . Cash on Hand and Due from Banks,

Cash on hand and due from banks epresents the actual cash held in the vaults of the bank, together with the noney which the bank has on deposit with the Federal Reserve bank and with correspondent banks. It may also include checks deposited for col lection which are drawn on other anks. This amount includes the lecal reserve explained in a previous

I. Loans and Discounts, \$982,339.29 Loans made to responsible persons, irms, and corporations, against prom ssory notes, either secured or unsecured, are entered under the heading Loans and Discounts. All loans and iscounts are passed upon by officers of the bank, whose chief concern in making a loan is to see that it is well secured, either by the personal credit of the borrower, or by adequate collateral. Interest from loans is the principal source of the bank's earn-

III. U. S. Bonds To Secure Circulation

As has been explained, these bonds are held by national banks to secure circulating notes. A national bank is no longer required to buy and hold Inited States bonds unless it wishes issue circulating notes.

V. Redemption Fund \$1,250.

When national bank notes becomlirty and unfit for circulation, they re sent to the United States Treasiry for redemption, and the amount of the notes is charged to the redemp tion fund. The bank pays the Treasury and receives in return new crisp noney for the amount redeemed.
