JAPANESE LABORERS
will he Emplogeal in Pulling Reats this
Fall
Kane county is being invaded
by Japanese farm laborers for the
first time in its history. Jap
labor has been hit upon as a
solution of the farmers' troubles
in securing men to pull the 2,ooo
acres of sugar beets in the vicini-
ty of Elgin. More than a dozen
arrived last week and many times
this number are expected when
the beet harvest season reaches
its height.
Hungarian laborers, used ex-
tensively in the past, are seeking
other lines of emplovment and
the Mikado's subjects are rapidly
taking their places. The Mon-
golian promises to become a fac-
tor in the sugar beet industry and
reports from the Rock County
Sugar company of Janesville,
Wis., that buys pracrically the
entire output in the Flgin district,
are to the effect that the yellow
men will be hired in great num-
bers this year.
District Manager G. W. Seward
of Marengo went to Elgin to
place the first consignment of
Japanese laborers. The season
will open next week although it
is not probable that many of the
raisers will ship their crops be-
fore the latter part of the ensuing
month.
There are some beets in the
vicinity of Genoa, but thus far we
have escaped the Japs.
