

KENOSHA JURIST MISSING SECOND TIME IN 18 YEARS

Judge Joseph R. Clarkson Disappears from Home Under Circumstances Recalling Former Strange Case.

Kenosha, Wis., July 20.—Judge Joseph R. Clarkson, junior member of the law firm of Baker & Clarkson and a man well known throughout the country as an author, lecturer and jurist, has disappeared.

He has been missing since last Wednesday night and the fact of his disappearance has revived the story of his mysterious disappearance from Omaha 18 years ago, which attracted public attention all over the United States, but which wes never explained. notwithstanding the fact that he returned home after five months' ab-

At that time it was stated that Judge Clarkson had suffered a lapse of memory, and the circumstances attending the case were so strange and improbable that the story became a study for psychic organizations all over the country. Clarkson was supposed to have been drowned. His clothing was found on the bank of a small lake near Omaha, where he had been widely known as a district judge and politician, and search for his body was kept up for months.

The judge came to himself while working as a common laborer in a lumber yard at Clinton, Ia., and at once returned to Omaha and resumed his practice of law.

The question that is being asked everywhere in Kenosha is: "Has Judge Clarkson had another lapse of memory?" Last Wednesday night he was in consultation with District Attorney R. V. 



Washington, July 18 .- Government geologists have again entered the international guessing contest on how hold out. The date which is fixed in their latest bulletin is the year 2040 worm among soldiers enlisted from survey. It deplores also the waste of coal in mining.

"Waste in mining," says the report "loses forever about one-half as much coal as is marketed. This half is either left in the ground in thin beds or in the shape of pillars to support the roof. No More Coal After 2040, A. D.

"Coal has been extensively mined in the United States for not much more than half a century, but the consumption is increasing so enormously that if this increase should continue all the easily accessible coal would be exhausted by the year 2040 and all coal by the middle of the twenty-first century. It will, of course, not continue at such a rate, for the increasing scarcity will raise prices and check consumption. Water power, too, will undoubtedly largely take its place." SUTTON TRAGEDY GIVEN NEW ANGLE BY LIEUT. WILLIAM F. BEVAN.

### HE DISAGREES WITH ADAMS

Declares Officer Who Admits Fight with Marine Sat on Victim When Fatal Shot Was Fired - Girl's Name Brought into Case.

Annapolis, Md., July 21.—The proceedings of the court of inquiry which is investigating the death of Lieut. James N. Sutton, United States Marine corps of Portland, Ore., took a sensational turn yesterday when First Lieut. William F. Bevan of the United States Marine corps, now attached to the battleship New Jersey, took the witness stand and related his part in the tragedy.

Lieut. Bevan was officer of the guard in the marine camp on that night, and one of the first men to reach the scene of Sutton's death. Like Lieut, Adams, he testified that Sutton deliberately shot himself, but beyond that cardinal fact, his description of Sutton's alleged suicide varied in important details from the story told by Adams, the man who said he had participated in a life and death struggle with the young Oregon lieutenant just before his act of selfdestruction.
