FIERCE SEA HITS LIKER ONE SEAMAN KILLED AND SIX IN-

New York, Jan. 7.—One of her crew was killed and six others seriously injured when the Cunard liner Etruria was fighting her way through a severe storm on Friday night. The body From Constitution—House Favors of the man killed was buried at sea. The others injured were in her hospital when the steamer arrived Sun-

> Friday night while the Etruria was plowing through heavy head seas and great waves were breaking over her deck the lashing on the starboard anchor davits were torn loose. New lashings were put on, but some hours later they broke loose again. The watch of nine men once more started forward to secure them, but just as they completed their task a huge wave seaman, was swept the full length of stairway leading to the main deck. He struck squarely on the rail at the foot of the stairs and his spine was

HURLS BOMB IN A BANK; TWO DEAD

ROLLO STEELE, REFUSED LOAN DROPS MISSILE IN PHILA-DELPHIA INSTITUTION.

Thrower and Cashier Blown to Pieces -Six Employes Injured, Some of Whom May Die-Explosion Completely Wrecks Office.

Philadelphia, Jan. 7.—Demanding a loan of \$5,000 and failing to get it, Rollo Steele, formerly of Garner, Ia., and Chicago, dropped a bomb urday, blowing him to pieces, instantly killing Cashier W. Z. McLear and injuring six others.

Blast Causes Great Excitement.

The Fourth Street National bank is the largest financial institution in the city and occupies the greater portion of the first floor of the Bullitt building on Fourth street between Chestnut and Walnut streets in the heart of the financial district. The explosion was terrific and it caused tremendous excitement in the crowded building and the street.

The explosion occurred a few minues before 12 o'clock, at a time when the bank is usually well filled with persons in a hurry to transact business before the bank closes. No one saw Steele enter the bank except E. F. Shanbacher, the vice president, who was passing out of the building on his way to luncheon. He noticed the man was poorly dressed, looked like a Russian and carried a small parcel. The man walked straight back to the rear of the bank and asked a clerk to direct him to the office of the president, Richard H. Rushton. What took place in his office is best told by the president himself:

Two Lives Snuffed Out.

At the time the explosion occurred all the vaults were open, books were piled on desks and papers of all sorts cated at 228 West Main street, and of value were lying on desks preparatory to being put away for the day. The explosion devastated the interior of the big banking room. Glass and isfy a claim by J. W. Woodford and wooden partitions were wrecked and leveled to the ground as though a mortgage for \$396. 

"Every state hospital for the insane is now crowded beyond its normal capacity. The excess, a necessarily shifting quantity, is about 300. Within six months each hospital will be compelled to return county patients to county almshouses in its district. In the county almshouses (not including Cook county) to-day there are about 500 insane persons, who should be cared for by the state. In Cook county there are 2,100 insane patients receiving county care. In all Illinois counties there are 2,100 such patients. Adding the 300 excess population in our state institutions, there are 2,400 persons in state and county institutions not feceiving proper state care. The state can give better care to these unfortunates than can any county, because of better equipment, better classification and higher-salaried physicians and other employes. The county is too small a governmental unit to satisfactorily care for insane persons. This requires the larger resources of the state. Means should be devised to bring about complete state care in Illinois. The state problem now.

"Recognizing that the buildings and mechanical equipment of most of the tate institutions were erected and intalled many years ago, before architectural and engineering science had reached the high mark of advancement obtaining now, a survey has been made by he state architect of these institutions. It is scaling their recommendations down to hose items which they consider necestary for the physical operation of the institutions, the safety of the inmates and, in some cases, their well-being and comort, the total appropriation asked for \$730,000. This figure was arrived at after conferences attended by the board of charities, superintendents, trustees, engineers, myself and others. The total calls for an extraordinary appropriation, all items that can be cared for in the orilinary and usual special appropriations of the several institutions having been peelfied in the usual manner. I recommend that the general assembly make his extra appropriation out of the state number."



The fact that it is now impossible for an individual to protect those dependent on his labors and also to guard nearly every business enterprise with the protection which insurance affords, shows how intimately it is connected with the domestic and economic life of our citizens. Therefore legislation relating to this subject should be judiclously, wisely and conscientiously considered.







Fig. 1. Diagram of Ventilator.

Take a glass jar and half fill it with water. Then, by means of a glass tube which reaches to the bottom of the jar, pour an equal amount of hydrochloric acid under the water, as shown in Fig. 1, until the water rises to the top of the jar. If no effort be made to mix the two liquids they will remain neatly separated for days, the density of commercial hydrochloric acid being greater than that of water. Let an egg sink gently into the water. It will pass through it, reach the hydrochloric acid zone, and there almost instantaneously become covered with a thick layer of bubbles. 

FORMALIN IN MILK.

Its Use Does Not Render the Milk Sterile.

The use of formalin or formaldehyde in milk does not render that milk sterle, as many have supposed. Formalin when combined with a certain propor tion of water is called formaldehyde, and in articles and discussions is therefore practically the same, the diference being only in the strength of the solution used. Profs. F. D. Cheser and T. R. Brown, of the Delaware station, have been making some thorough investigations into the use sert their belief that if formaldehyde were used at the rate of one part of the formaldehyde to 40,000 parts of milk the results would not be injurious to the health of the persons using the milk, while the milk would keep two or three times as long, as it would if not treated. The professors do not say so, remarks the Farmer's Review, but the fact is that if milkmen and others are allowed to use formalin at all there is no probability that they will be so exact in their applications of the poison as to use only one part in 40,000. Cleaning Steel Knives.


