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AFTER AUTO LAW BREAKERS

More Licenses Already This Year Issued By State than All Last Year

More automobile licenses have been issued already this year than were issued during all of last year and a quarter of a million dollars more in fees has been collected, than was collected in 1922, Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson announced Tuesday.

Since January 1 this year 787,600 automobiles have been registered in the Secretary of State's office. The fees collected to date this year total \$8,118,469. The total collection of the automobile last year were \$7,861,211.

The previous year's total registration is reached this year a month earlier than usual, which is attributed by Secretary of State Emmerson to the efficiency of the force of inspectors working under him. More than 400 arrests of drivers who have neglected securing their 1923 licenses have been made since March 1 when the round up of delinquent drivers began. A motorcycle squad of inspectors has been started out over the state. This is the first time motorcycles have been used by the state inspectors and those who are still violating the law by using old licenses will be rounded up in a hurry. These inspectors will enforce not only the license law, but all other automobile laws.

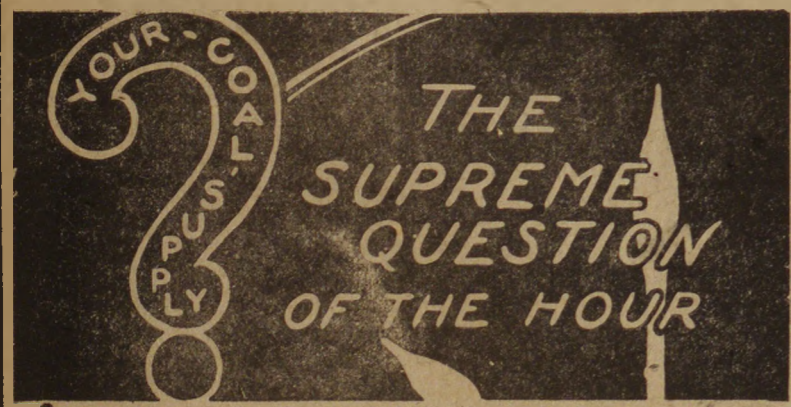

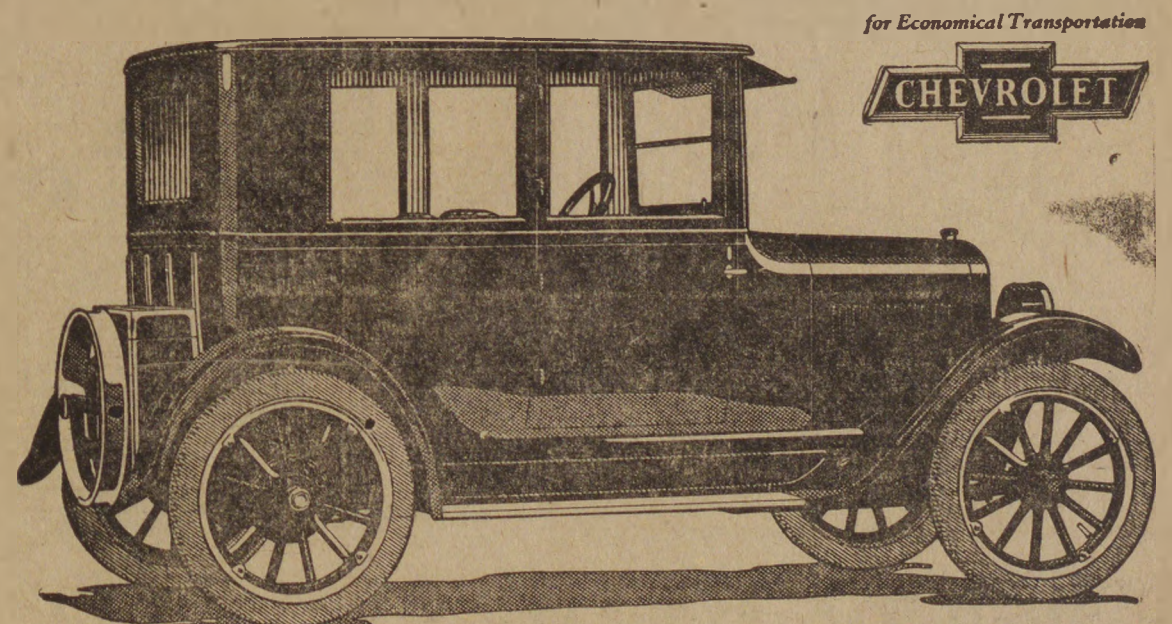
