#### DISEASES OF METALS.

The Way Steel and Copper Become Impregnated With Poison.

Many metals show symptoms of poisoning, rendering them unfit for use. Thus steel can, by means of small quantities of hydrogen and under certain circumstances, be very seriously affected. Let us take two Reading....Battle of Gettysburg steel bars of the same material, both heated to a red heat, one surrounded by air, the other exposed to the influences of hydrogen or hydrogen gas, chilling both bars in water aft er heating. We shall find the bar heated in hydrogen to be brittle whereas the other bar, heated in air, will turn out to be far superior. The hydrogen has in this instance acted like poison upon the heated steel, and very small quantities of such poisonous matter will suffice cured, it only being necessary to warm compresses in the case of hu-






