AN IMMENSE SHIPMENT

One Shipment of Binder Twine Aggregate 750 Tons—Fifty Cars to Transport

Recently there was received in Chicago, the largest shipment of binder twine known in the world's history. The shipment comprised a train of 50 cars, and was sent from the mills of Hooven & Allison company of Xenia, Ohio, and aggregated 750 tons in weight. There were 300,000 balls, and some man, with plenty of time at his disposal, figured out, that if the balls were unwound, the string would reach 150,000 miles, and would encircle the globe at the line of the equator six times, with enough left over to reach from New York City to Cleveland, Ohio.

The immense shipment was transferred to the Rock Island road, and will be distributed to various points in Iowa and Kansas.
