### MCCORMICK CORN BINDER.

A Successful Test of a Very Successful Machine.

Quite a number of farmers and others were present at a test of the McCormick corn binder on the James Wydle farm, better known as the Wager farm, on last Saturday afternoon. The corn binder is the latest acquisition to the long list of labor-saving machines, and if the expressions of satisfaction uttered by the spectators last Saturday is any criterion, the McCormick corn binder will soon find its way into the hands of every grower of corn in this vicinity.

This machine gave the most satisfactory results in cutting and binding the corn without a slip, and doing its work very rapidly. A team of light horses were hitched to it and did their work with but little effort, despite the fact that the corn was exceedingly heavy and thick. As in prior tests it has been urged that the binding was placed too low on the bundles, and should be about the ears, but this is more of an advantage than otherwise, when it is taken into consideration that when the corn is ready for the general harvest, it has developed larger ears, and it is not desirable to place the band directly about them, as it would interfere with husking the corn without untying the bands, which can be done under the present method, resulting in a great saving of fodder and labor. It is also a fact that large ears would materially increase the diameter of the bundle at that point, and to bind about them would not only require more cord, but it would be impossible to secure the necessary impression without the packers and other mechanism working directly among the ears, which would result in breaking them. The McCormick corn binder of 1892 bound at the ears, but proved so unsatisfactory for several reasons that it was changed.

SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the President and board of Trustees, of the village of Genoa, Illinois. That there shall be levied, assessed and collected upon the personal and real property, within the corporate limits of the village of Genoa, as the same may be returned by the assessor of said village for the year of one thousand eight hundred and ninety five: The sum of five hundred and eighty dollars for streets and sidewalks and the sum of five hundred and twenty dollars for fees and salaries, and the sum of five hundred dollars for contingencies.

SEC. 2. The village clerk shall file a certified copy of this ordinance with the county clerk of the county of DeKalb and state of Illinois on or before the third day of September A. D. 1895, so that the tax may be by him extended on the collector's book for said year agreeable to the statute in case made and provided.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall be known as ordinance No. 80. Passed Aug. 9th 1895. Published Aug. 15th 1895.

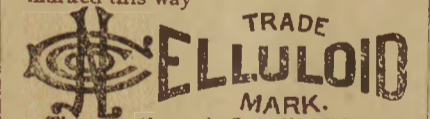
