WAS NINETY TWO YEARS OLD

Death Occurred at The Home of Her Daughter Mrs. James Hewitt on Locust Street

Mrs. Eliza R. Stewart, for many years a resident of Genoa, passed away last Wednesday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Jas. Hewitt, at the extreme old age of ninety two years.

The funeral service will take place Friday at 10:30 from the home and at 1:30 from the Flora township church near Irene. Rev. T. E. Ream, pastor of the M. E. church of Genoa, will conduct the service and burial will take place at the Flora cemetery.

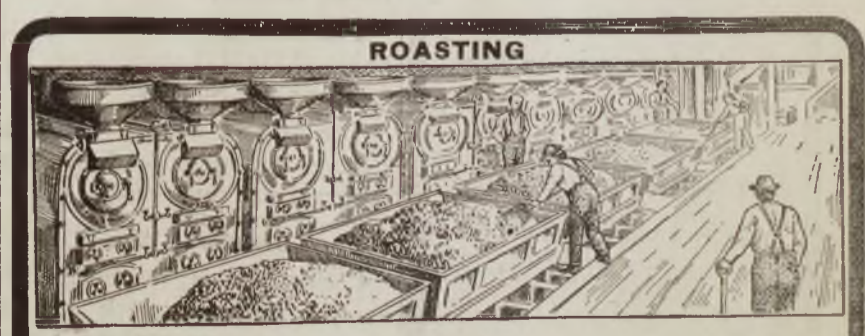
