

MURDER DONE IN COLORADO

Election Judges and Deputy Sheriff Clash and the Ready Pistol Does the Rest.

Chipple Creek, Colo., Nov. 9,-Two Democratic election judges were killed in this district, a Peabody deputy sheriff was mortally wounded, and several Democratic judges were beaten and thrown into jail. Isaac Idelbolt and Chris Miller, judges at Goldfield, were shot by one of Sheriff Bell's deputies. They had ordered the deputies out of the polling place. One refused to go, and, turning upon the judges, shot and killed them.

At Midway Ed Doyle, a deputy sheriff, attacked Mrs. Kennedy, a Democratic judge, and in the struggle that ensued tore her dress and slapped her. Ed O'Leary, a Democratic watcher, interfered, and shot Dovle, fatally wounding him. O'Leary was arrested. James Warford, the deputy who killed the two election officers, was a secret service man during the military rule in the district. Miller and Idelbolt were union men.
