DAIRMEN HOLD OUT

Nine Milk Plants of Northern Illinois Threatened with Shortage

Nine milk plants of North-eastern Illinois are threatened with a shortage of milk during the summer months because of the refusal of farmers to sign contracts under the prices announced by the Borden Co. Wednesday morning. They offer the same prices as paid last year.

At some of the branches no signers were obtained, the farmers driving away from the plant as soon as they had seen the prices posted on the bulletin board.

The factories hit by the hold-out are Dundee, Algonquin, Marengo, Huntley, Alden, Hebron, Genoa Junction, Woodstock and McHenry. According to W. J. Kittle, secretary of the Milk Producers' Association, 98 per cent of the dairymen of these districts have pledged themselves to stand by the demands of the association. The farmers of the Elgin district signed the usual number of contracts.

The Borden prices are 22 cents below the demand while those of Borden are only 9 2/3 cents above Borden's.

Held for Murder
